The Board of Mayor and Alderman met in regular session on September 5, 2017 with Mayor Pucciarelli calling the meeting to order at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall building, 330 Colwyn, Cumberland Gap, TN.

Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call of the Board Members. Board Members answered as follows: Susan Bain-here; Chuck Coffey- absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - here; John Ravnum-here; Phillip Waller-yes.

At this time the attorney administered the oath to Matthew McClung, the new city judge.

Mayor Pucciarelli called for approval of the minutes. Jerry Hopson made a motion to the approve minutes, with a second by Phillip Waller. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

Mayor Pucciarelli next called for the Financial Report. Town Recorder, Linda Moyers, reported the balances of all the accounts. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a motion to approve the Financial Report. Jerry Hopson made a motion to approve the financial report, with a second by Susan Bain. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

Mayor Pucciarelli directed the meeting to approval of the bills. Town Recorder, Linda Moyers, reported the total bills due for all the accounts. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a motion to approve the bills. Jerry Hopson made a motion to pay the bills, with a second by Susan Bain. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

### **Finance**

### Law and Order

The law enforcement agreement with the county has been signed the city judge is in place. The officer and the judge will get together to discuss court dates.

### **Historical**

The Historic Zoning Commission meeting scheduled for September 7, 2017 was cancelled since there were no items to be discussed.

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#### **Streets**

According to Phillip Waller, the soil conservationist made a cost efficient recommendation on how best to repair the issues with the creek on Llewellyn. He recommended cutting into the stream bottom 16 inches deep and fill it in with riprap rock to create a slope on the bank. The cost of the rock is estimated to cost around \$15 per ton, and approximately 40 tons is needed. Ray Paul doesn't feel he would be able to complete the job himself so a contractor is needed.

### Parks and Recreation

Mayor Pucciarelli asked that the board approve several repairs needed to Berkau Park. He stated that both bathrooms needed to be painted, the bathroom doors repaired, and the toilets replaced. He recommended using the money from the scrap metal sales.

Jerry Hopson made a motion approving the repairs and using the money from the scrap metal sales, with a second by John Ravnum. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson-absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

Claiborne County was awarded grant funds to prepare a 10-year Recreation Master Plan. The plan will focus on the park and recreation facilities and programs in the four (4) municipalities in the county. Each municipality is required to provide information on their existing recreation facilities and programs and any future plans over the next 10 years.

The grant contract is for \$60,000, which includes a match of \$12,000. Each municipality has agreed to contribute \$3,000 toward the matching funds. Since that amount was not included in the budget, a budget amendment will be drafted and discussed next month. Once each municipality provides the necessary information, then the master plan will be drafted. There will be public meetings and community based needs assessment surveys conducted for public impute.

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### Water

The bid opening for the Waterline Rehabilitation project took place on Tuesday August 8, 2017. Vaughn and Melton recommended award of the contract, in the amount of \$133,650, to Edwards Grading of New Tazewell, Tennessee.

Jerry Hopson made a motion to except the recommendation awarding the contract to Edwards Grading, with a second by Susan Bain. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

There was some discussion about the possibility of getting a grant for the purpose of digging a well. Mayor Pucciarelli said he has been researching the issue and the first step is to have a feasibility study done by an engineering firm. A location must be determined and an infiltration system would have to be installed. Mayor Pucciarelli has been in contact with East Tennessee Development District to research a possible grant and with Vaughn and Melton concerning the feasibility study.

### Sewer

The equipment for the samplers and the flow meter sensor has been ordered.

The repair of ten (10) manholes have been completed. It is estimated to have corrected at least seven (7) percent of the infiltration issues.

# Fire Department

Two hoses, which cost \$300 apiece, had to be replaced on the Jaws of Life.

The fire department will be hosting firefighters night at Angelo's on September 11, 2017. A percentage of the sales and tips will be given to the department. All the money placed inside the boot will go directly to the department.

At last month's meeting, Fire Chief, Chase Elswick, discussed the possibility of opening a savings account for the department. He recommended \$3,000 per year be set aside in a separate account each year that would be earmarked for tanker, engine, equipment replacement, and building repairs in the future. They felt it was better to save for those expenses over a period of time instead of having to come up with the funds all at once.

Jerry Hopson made a motion to open a fire department savings account to be used for the above expenses, to transfer \$3,000 per year in the account (\$100,000 maximum), and appoint the following people as authorized signatures on the account: Chuck Coffey, Jerry Hopson, Linda Moyers, Ray Paul, and John Ravnum. John Ravnum seconded the motion. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

#### **Demolition Order- 601 Pennlyn Street**

The vote to enforce the demolition order for 601 Pennlyn Street was addressed again this month.

Mayor Pucciarelli wanted everyone to understand that regardless of the outcome of the vote, a compromise between the Historic Zoning Committee and the property owner can still take place.

Jerry Hopson made a motion authorizing the town attorney, Jim Estep, to proceed with the execution of the demolition order. Susan Bain seconded the motion. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. Board members voted as follows: Susan Bain-yes; Chuck Coffey-absent; Teresa Fuson- absent; Jerry Hopson - yes; John Ravnum-yes; Phillip Waller-yes.

### **Patching Quotes**

The board reviewed the two (2) proposals received, from Willis Paving and Backwoods Paving, for pothole patching.

Phillip Waller made a motion approving the proposal from Willis Paving in the amount of \$2, 975, with a second by John Ravnum. Mayor Pucciarelli called for a roll call vote. #### **Tree Removal Quotes**

The board reviewed the two (2) proposals received, from Sharps Tree Service and Lee County Tree Service, for tree removal in Festival Park and Berkau Park. Both companies submitted two (2) different cost: (1) cost to grind and clean up all stumps; (2) cost to grind and leave all stumps (the town would be responsible for the cleanup).

Jerry Hopson made a motion approving the proposal from Sharps Tree Service in the amount of \$3,650 (which is the cost to grind and cleanup all stumps.) Susan Bain second the motion. 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### Ordinance 6-2017- An Ordinance Amending the 2017-2018 Budget
